Exploring cross-artform appreciation attributes among Hong Kong audiences

Abstract

Based on interviews with professional artists and ordinary audiences that suggested

four components of audience experiences on different art forms, namely, art genre, aesthetic

judgment, function and context. Art genre refers to art classifications and includes a variety of

art choices, artwork presentation style and inspiration. Aesthetic judgment refers to aesthetic

evaluation based on artwork quality, complexity, artistic context, coherence, and aesthetic level.

The function is the by-product of art experiences which satisfy human needs and desires,

including individual and social needs. Context is the condition before audiences encounter any

artworks, hosting context, artist expertise, and prior knowledge will influence audience choices

and perceptions. Thematic analyses were conducted on the transcribed responses to identify

unique art appreciation attributes, 39 scale items were developed according to these attributes.

This collection of novel data moves beyond the conventional particular art genres appreciation

to offer new knowledge, to understand audience experiences in different forms of art with the

same appraisal factors.
